at the Churchill Northern Studies Centre

The Churchill Northern Studies Centre is excited to announce design and planning of a \$15 million facility upgrade is underway. Improvements to the Launch Road facility will include both renovations and new constructions scheduled over the next three to five years. These ambitious plans will dramatically transform the Centre and pave the way for continued excellence in internationally recognized northern research and education.

The planned revitalization and expansion of the Centre will meet many goals. In addition to facilitating continuing research, an improved facility will attract new and cutting edge projects, enhance public education programming, and boost quality of the visitor experience. Research users especially, will benefit from improvements in laboratory and classroom facilities, and more efficient office spaces will be created. Dormitory accommodations will be enhanced, with washroom facilities augmented. Everyone will benefit from improvements to the cafeteria. Energy conservation will be a focus for the redevelopment and new environmental efficiencies will be sought throughout the renewal project.

This edition of The Birdfish is dedicated to introducing you, our loyal members, to the many important aspects of this transformative development. Between these covers, and in future editions, you will find invitations to participate in the planning and design of the new Centre, and share in the excitement of achievement as projects progress and milestones are reached. Integrated Designs Inc., a Saskatoon-based company with an office in Winnipeg, has been hired to coordinate design and to provide comprehensive project management for the duration of the redevelopment. "We're excited to take on the role of project managers for the CNSC and partner with an organization that is equally excited about developing a high-performance, practical, sustainable building project that exceeds traditional design and construction standards, and is proud to show leadership in sustainable development," explains Murray Guy, founder of Integrated Designs Inc. and a pioneer in promoting the integrated design approach.

This exciting redevelopment of the Centre becomes a reality through the support of a \$1 million challenge grant, generously awarded by The W. Garfield Weston Foundation. This tremendous gift was instrumental in leveraging support from likeminded foundations and businesses: \$2.2 million in contributions have been received from the private sector. The CNSC aims to raise another \$800,000 from private sources and is also working closely with all levels of government to secure additional project financing.

Integrated Designs Inc. has established itself as a sustainability leader in western Canada. Pioneers in the use of design integration in constructing facilities that use 50% less energy at no additional capital cost, they attribute their success to two things: a focus on collaboration – to achieve the necessary design integration goals; and on innovation – to achieve total life cycle cost and sustainable objectives within the constraints of traditional budgets.

The Integrated Design Process

Renewal of the Churchill Northern Studies Centre will take this approach one step further by applying it to the entire redevelopment process. Integrated project delivery will bring together people, systems, and business practices into a process that harnesses the talents and insights of all participants. This will increase value to the Centre, reduce waste, optimize project results, and maximize efficiency through all phases of design and construction.

One of the first steps in this process is to define the project requirements. Integrated Designs Inc. is working with the Centre to determine those requirements and is leading the process of establishing the project charter.

A conceptual planning session will be held this fall to set design and process guidelines, refine the project requirements, and establish project delivery schedules.

User feedback and participation in the conceptual stages of planning is also important to the

process of formulating the project vision. Suggestions and ideas brought forward from stakeholders, Centre members, and program participants are encouraged and will be considered for inclusion in design plans.

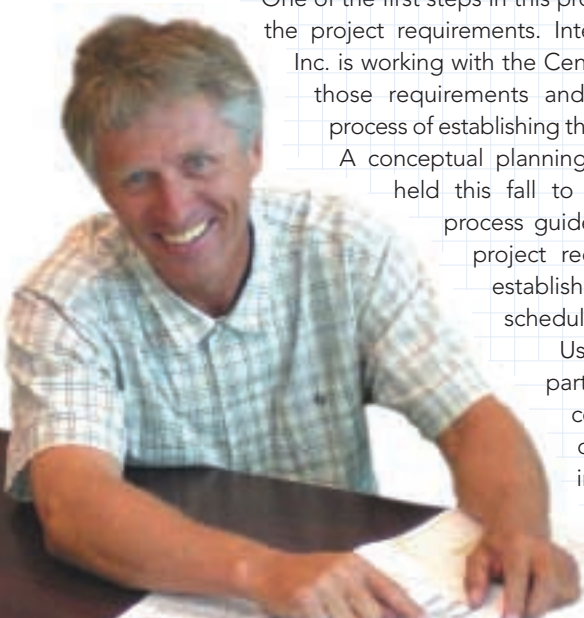
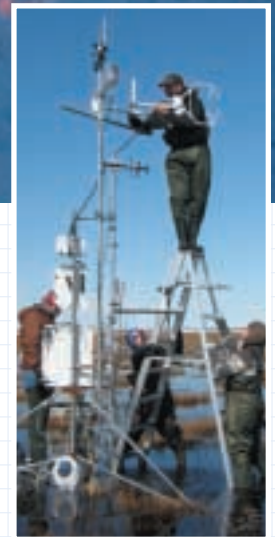
Build Smarter, Build Better

A feasibility study is underway that includes research into an R60 monolithic dome as part of the new construction. Such a structure may be well suited to Churchill's harsh winter climate. Other feasibility studies will follow.

The project will target Gold certification with the Canada Green Building Council's LEED™ rating system. LEED™ stands for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design. This rating system ensures that the project will meet rigorous criteria regarding energy and atmosphere, water efficiency, indoor environmental quality, sustainability, use of materials and resources,

and innovation and design practice.

There are many benefits to developing a facility with an integrated approach to design and development. The collaborative process described will ensure the project meets expectations for quality, budget and schedule. It will also result in a safe, healthy and comfortable facility our research clients, other visitors and staff will enjoy for years to come. ❄️

The W. Garfield Weston Foundation

As announced in our cover story, the CNSC is moving forward with ambitious plans for renovation and new construction. This exciting development comes in no small part to the generous support of The W. Garfield Weston Foundation.

The W. Garfield Weston Foundation is a Canadian charitable foundation committed to making grants in Canada for the benefit of Canadians. The Foundation is named for Willard Garfield Weston, who established bakery and other successful enterprises throughout Canada. For three generations, The W. Garfield Weston Foundation has maintained a family tradition of helping charitable organizations to make a difference and enhance the quality of life for Canadians. According to the Foundation's mandate, most of the grant making is directed to education and the environment.

The Foundation was impressed by the sustainability of the Churchill Northern Studies Centre and its success in science and education. They are hopeful that the challenge will inspire others to support this worthwhile initiative.

The Foundation first heard of our plans through their ongoing partnership with the Nature Conservancy of Canada. The awarding of the challenge grant in February of 2008 represented the culmination of almost five years of careful analysis and planning. Countless hours were devoted to preparing business plans, financial models and construction estimates. The Foundation worked quietly in the background through this entire process providing advice and guidance when required. These critical first steps not only confirmed the viability of the project, but were instrumental to the success of the subsequent fundraising campaign.

Most importantly, numerous representatives of the Foundation have taken the opportunity to visit the Centre. In their words, *"The stark beauty of the North with its abundant wildlife was truly astonishing and something that every Canadian should see and experience."* From these shared experiences came the inspiration and encouragement to **"think big"**, to step back and fully consider what would be required to provide world-class facilities worthy of more than thirty years of research excellence. 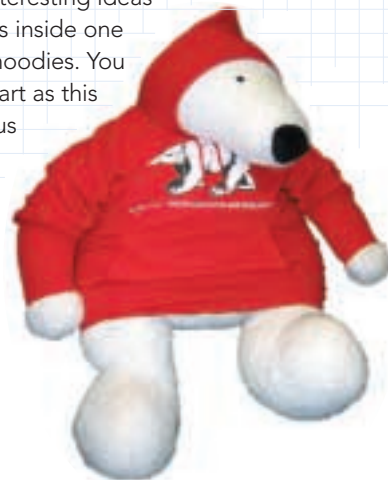

International Polar Year Funds Equipment and Training Upgrades

This past spring, a \$40,000 award from International Polar Year (IPY) was provided to the CNSC to improve operational safety at the Centre. The focus of this funding, extended through the Logistics for Health and Safety component of IPY, allowed for staff safety training and the purchase of new equipment.

The first order of business was to recertify staff in CPR and Wilderness First Aid. A pair of instructors from Momenta, a Winnipeg-based, outdoor education company, qualified in Sirius Wilderness Medicine, spent two days in Churchill running staff through a rigorous refresher that included survival situation testing. Whew! This stimulating review spurred the purchase of new and improved first-aid kits, fully stocked with items introduced in the training sessions. Research staff also completed training in WHMIS and the Transportation of Dangerous Goods.

This was a significant financial contribution from IPY and, by far, the most exciting part was the shopping!!! The lion's share of

the grant was invested in long-dreamed-for items such as satellite phones, hand-held radios, flotation suits, rescue beacons, and new firearm and ammunition security cabinets. CNSC staffers LeeAnn Fishback, Kim Daley, and Carley Basler, rose to the considerable challenge of tracking down the "best buys". Purchases for the laboratory included two new drying ovens, a fume hood, and chemical storage fixtures. The acquisition of these larger pieces inspired a little housecleaning in the lab and some of the outmoded "rocket range era" equipment was discarded, making room for the new items and, most important, more science!

IPY's boost to the Centre's operational infrastructure offered a so-sweet taste of things to come as we look forward to designing and building the new facility. ❄️

View the aurora from the comfort of our heated viewing dome by night and explore the Churchill area by day. Local tours, cultural presentations and an afternoon of dog mushing offer a taste of life in the subarctic. The Churchill Northern Studies Centre, your home for five days, sits in the shadow of massive 1950's era rocket launch towers. As the lights arc overhead in curtains of white, green and red, you'll swear you can hear the countdown. ❄️

"While I've seen many photos and videos of the lights, nothing can approach the experience of standing there with those lights dancing and changing colors or snaking overhead in a winding river of light, bright enough to read a book by. Introducing the lights to those who have seen them rarely, or never at all, is my richest secret reward."
